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## Burma Research Institute Releases the Remarks of President Zo Tum Hmung at the IRF Roundtable with the U.S. Government

Good morning!

I am Zo Tum Hmung, President of the Burma Research Institute (BRI).

Thank you for the opportunity to talk about the systematic violations of religious freedom in Burma.

As you probably already know, <u>DHS Secretary Noem announced</u> the termination of Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for Burma effective January 26, 2026. This is not good news for the people from Burma. I have friends, mostly Christian minister, who are here with TPS. The rationale for the Secretary's decision was, "Burma has made notable progress in governance and stability". This is not correct. The Burmese military has continued atrocities against religious minorities including Christians.

On November 20, 2025, the <u>Khonumthung Burmese</u> reported that the Burmese military's fighter jets dropped bombs twice on Thuklai village in Chin State, Burma on November 19 at midnight Myanmar Time. The bombs destroyed the church called Assembly of God and the school.

The source, who is familiar with the situation on the ground, told BRI that there was no conflict or fighting, at the time of the bombing, between the resistance groups and the Burmese military at Thuklai village. The source further said that the resistance groups were not hiding at the Church as they are also Christians.

I would like to urge the Administration to protect religious freedom in Burma. Thank you.
